
I speak for the entire OACRAO Board when I say that we hope this organization serves your professional development needs all year long. The

Recruiting Students for 2021!

Unprecedented, pivot, zoom, quarantine, remote work, pandemic. Have we ever used these words as much in our lives as we have these past 9 months? Admissions Offices have been challenged like never before in trying to recruit classes during such a time as this. In the midst of several years of declining eligible students (in Ohio) more intense competition and the explosion of new ways to reach students, a pandemic hits and turns our world upside down. For the class of 2020, many colleges already had the bulk of their applicants and had established themselves with them by the time we went home to work last March. It became a matter of assuring them that we were still available to them, though virtually, and that we would, in fact, be open in the fall.

Recruiting the class of 2021 is much different. By this time Admissions officers would have spent the previous three months meeting potential students *in person* in their high schools, at college fairs and on campus for individual or group visits. We would have taken them to lunch in our cafeterias, sat them down in faculty offices and residence halls, maybe even driven them from place to place. Most of those things are no longer an option so we do the best we can in a virtual world. We have moved to virtual personal campus visits, online tours, virtual open houses, parties and movie nights. Instagram and facebook have become the new meet and greet areas. Scholarship and honors interviews are done via Zoom or Slate. Some offices have hired vendors to do the virtual work. Coaches are watching athletes' games via livestream, music auditions are done from the comfort of the students' homes, art projects are mailed in for scholarship consideration. We are learning a whole new language and suite of communication channels. The upside? We might be becoming more efficient. Many colleges are seeing an uptick of visits from students out of state because virtual visits are now the norm and not the last choice for a student who lives far from campus. National surveys indicate that high school seniors aren't applying as early as they have in the past so our historical statistics are off. That also means that we all still have a fighting chance to bring in the class, meet our goals and maintain our campus enrollment. We're watching budgets and counting applications, COVID hasn't changed that. We will get through this year and do what we always do, move them in and start all over in the fall, however that may look.
